Connecting Thoughts, May 26, 2020

Grace and peace to you all in this season of our lives.

This month's Connecting Thoughts will be an amalgamation of things we are doing, facing, and anticipating. How we have been, how we are, and how we will live out our faith in these times will be our witness to the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ.

First, our ongoing missional response to the Covid-19 Crises response has people dropping off food and other items to share with many in our broader community. We have members of the worshipping community gathering the donations, sorting, and delivering them to the Eastern Service Workers and the households they support. As the school year ends for our Head Start families we are working on ways to continue to share food and paper goods with them. The Covid Emergency Relief Fund that was created by the two Session has distributed the money given by people. It is now beginning the distribution of the first \$10,000 of the \$20,000 set aside by the Sessions for relief work. The Eastern Service Workers Association, Ewing-Lawrence Head Start families, and Home Front will all receive grants. The team responsible for allocating the grants is looking at other ways to connect with the needs of our immediate community. The team is allocating \$3,500 for use through the Pastor's Discretionary Fund to assist members of the worshiping community and local families.

The recent run of shootings in Trenton and area remind us that the Pandemic has not ended the many challenges to our community. In the last few weeks, 7 people have been killed by gunfire, another 7 wounded. For six years we have joined with others in remembering those who have died violently over the previous year, gathering with surviving family members and those who share their grief. The current health crisis has meant the canceling of the Annual Unity in the Community gathering. The United Mercer Interfaith Organization is working to gather family members and caring people for a virtual gathering on Sunday afternoon, June 28. Please hold our community in prayers for an end of this violence, and a reign of dignity and respect that will seek the good of all.

I would like to invite you to join Ann and I in our Chat and Conversation times. They are opportunities to engage each other in times apart from the stress and uncertainty of the week. Ann has two chats, on Tuesday morning and Thursday evening. You will find the connections for those in this newsletter. My conversation is on Wednesdays, now at 6:30. I am looking forward to using this as a time to check in with people, but also as a time to share a thoughtful video for us to look at how our faith can support us in these days. The recordings we will be using will be able to be heard by those who join via phone. Come join me. Together, through our conversation, the strength of our faith, its impact on our lives, and our fruit of the Spirit will grow in our lives.

The two Session began the discussion of how and when the Ewing Covenant Worshiping Community might again begin to gather for worship in shared space. The overall attitude and approach is one of deep prayerful concern for the health and well-being of all who use our space, including our congregation's worship space in Fellowship Hall and the 1867 Sanctuary. We will be guided by our local and state government guidelines, by our learning the facts about the disease and the pandemic. We will talk, and pray, and work with the basic understanding that our worship, our prayers, done in whatever way, gathered or in isolation is real, and will bring God glory. That we will be known by our care for one another, and those around us.

We are also moving on toward the goal of these two congregations becoming one. There are two important dates coming up.

On Sunday, June 14, immediately following our Worship Service on Zoom, we will join in a shared Congregational Gathering. The two congregations will begin in a shared conversation, and then be separated into separate meeting for each congregation. The link and call in number for this gathering will be the same as the worship link. <u>This is a</u> <u>change from what the Covenant congregation</u> <u>had been previously told</u>. **Note the correct link in the June 14th schedule below.**

On Sunday, June 28, both congregations will gather for the meetings that will make the blending of the two churches into one official. Our plan is that the two will meet together, with each congregation voting on the actions necessary for the establishment of the corporate and ecclesiastical identity of the new, emerging, blended congregation. Then, when all is accomplished, we will celebrate. The link and phone in information for this meeting will be the same as the Worship link that morning.

Finally, our worshiping community will have a Summer Seminary Intern with from June 1 through August 16th. Alfredo (Freddy) Sanchez is a second year student at Princeton Seminary. He will be joining us from the Chicago area to complete his summer internship. He will labor with us for 36 hours per week for 11 weeks. Pastor Paul will be his supervisor as her works with both pastors in caring for the congregation, preaching and leading worship, and assisting the congregation in our on-line worship possibilities. His will be a unique experience as he works with us through gathering in separation, caring with voices that cover all that divides us, and as we learn who we are to become as this emerging congregation.

Connecting Thoughts – Pastor Ann

The trees of the Lord drink their fill, the Lebanon cedars He planted, where the birds make their nest.....Psalm 104:16-17

May is Older Adult month, and I have daily reflected upon the blessings I receive from older adults (Yes, you are right: I am now an older adult myself, completely official with an AARP membership). As I write this at the close of the Memorial Day observance, I am keenly aware of blessings of older adults which for a long time have been all around us: the cardministry from Margie Burtis, who writes notes not only to me, but to many of you as well on those occasions when we really need her words of wisdom and "Margie tlc". Blessings such as the soups and cakes Betty Newberry graciously contributes to our church. Blessings such as experiencing Dave Tregurtha sing "O Holy Night" for all to hear in the hospital despite being so near to the end of his life. Blessings such as Ralph Sims' sharing of his personal

museum of Black History collectibles and treasures with the church during Black History month. Blessings such as having known the pure heart of Gerri Apostolos, who, before she died, amazed us with her powerful readings from the Scriptures during our Sunday worship.

But in these final days of May, my attention has been also captured by those "older adults" who figured so significantly in my growing-up years. At first, I remembered the blessings I had received from the usual suspects—the four close-by neighbors (all church goers, btw), and also grandparents. Yet additional persons have surprisingly emerged from forgotten memories. And for these people now coming into sharper focus, I have newfound affection and gratitude. One of them, "Sis" Smith, only visited our house once, as far as I recall. Even though she lived just down the hill, and her elderly parents lived directly across from us.

As it turns out, Sis' one- and- only visit was on a rather cold day, just after dinnertime probably in about early May. It seems Sis had come to talk to my parents about a new softball league starting up for girls. Not being invited into the conversation, I tried to hear it. It is best to say I experienced the feel of it, being separated by a door. After Sis said her spiel, there was the usual silence, to signal resistance to the idea. Expecting Sis to be dismissed soon by clipped sentences of my mother, I was intrigued to hear instead my father's easy cadence. Before I knew it, Sis had left the house, the backdoor slapping shut. And a new rhythm entered my life that summer, as in the cool shade between our two houses, my Uncle Charlie and I spent mornings playing catch and improving my pitching.

Not until the spring before my father's death in 2015 did I realize that he and Sis had at least one common denominator which swung the decision my way when Sis visited on that day: as a young man back from service in WW2, my father had played a key role in organizing the town's Babe Ruth baseball league for boys. But any way you look at it, Sis Smith opened a door for me that had been closed. By doing this, she gave me, and all the girls of our town, a great blessing. This month, I've come to understand

that Sis' blessing has been one I've had to count on many times since then, too. Without a sense of the spaciousness of the Kingdom of God, I would not, as a woman, have walked through the door of ordained ministry. It would seem that God's Providence, once seen to shine so brightly, cannot easily thereafter be dismissed, doubted, or disregarded. Rather, I proceed now as if it is a given.

There is no denying that God's blessings and Providence links the generations. While sheltering- in -place but continuing to meet by zoom, leaders in our church have deepened community partnerships such as that with Life-Ties, which serves youth and emerging adults. And as our church takes a deep breath for this coming summer season, we welcome a student intern. I ask that you consider ways that you already are making a difference in the life of a child, youth, or young adult. And then consider some more, asking: What further impact can I pray for? How might one small but significant blessing I can share impact the life of a child, youth or young adult? Maybe it is writing a note; maybe it is opening a door to a world of opportunity. Start praving about this, and ready yourselves for a rich harvest of new ministries that seem poised, at this very moment, to surprise us.

Parenting Impact Center Responding to Basic Needs -Diapers and Food Brian Peterson

Since the beginning of April, Mercer Street

Friends Center for Parenting and Family Empowerment is responding to the needs of our clients by transforming a meeting room into a pantry, preparing bags of food along with distributing Diapers on Thursday afternoons. At first, we welcomed 5 families a week. Today, 50 families now seek support each week.

To maintain social distancing, as well as confidentiality, social workers contact the families directly, ascertain their needs and invite them to pick up their diaper and food package on the table outside the building. Sue Maloney, Supervisor of Parents as Teachers Program explained that, "Diapers are a precious commodity. They are expensive and not covered by SNAP (food stamps)." Matthew Mayer, Healthy Families Program Supervisor said that, "what we do here obviously won't solve everyone's problems, but we can give the families the supplies they need during the pandemic to alleviate stress as it creates problems and negative consequences that results."

To provide support to the Parent and Family Empowerment Diaper and Food Program, donations may be dropped off at the Food Bank warehouse located at 828 Silvia Street, Ewing, NJ 08628. Items may include:

Boxes of diapers, sizes 4-6

Nonperishable items such as baby food, baby snacks, juices, as well as rice, pasta, soup, cereal, etc., for families.
