From the Transitional Pastor's Study

Now that the weather becomes much hotter with high humidity that I was warned was coming, Jeannine and I look at our yard and wonder when we can pull the weeds in our overgrown gardens. What has slowed us down also is not really knowing what is flower and what is weed?! Things we think are weeds

in 5-10 days turn into beautiful flowers. See the photo for a flower now blooming that we have no idea what it is! But I'm glad I didn't pull it up earlier as a weed!



Of course, every gardener

is eager to show the *dahlias*, *roses*, or *lilies*, but what about the petunias? I've never had anyone invite me into their yard to look at *petunias*. We display the earliest *tulips* and the last *poinsettia*, but no one ever parades a *petunia*. Brides carry flowers ranging from *edelweiss* from the mountains to *lilies* of the valley; but no bride would consider carrying a *petunia*! When in seminary, Jeannine and I planted petunias in the flowerbox on our married student housing. In the evening we'd pluck the older blossoms and more multiplied in the morning.

But everyone ignores the *petunia*! And yet it goes on blooming. It's time someone appreciated it. Perhaps pastors are unusually sensitive to flowers because they remind them of people. In fact, any group of people has about as many varieties of "plants" as does the garden.

Every group has its *roses* that must be handled with kid gloves to avoid pain and hurt; its *azaleas* that produce only if the soil and sunshine is exactly to their liking; its *irises* quickly susceptible to rot if it is not

constantly in the sunshine. We could go on and on—from the *aster* that wilts; the *snap-dragons* that rust; the shrinking *violets* that need to be encouraged; the stubborn *glads*, who cannot be bent; the regal *chrysan-themum* that stands out in the crowd, and fits into the situation only if it is in command; the tender *morning glory* that blooms in splendor at the beginning of the day, but fades at noon. Every variety of people needs some special attention to make it bloom—**except** the *petunia*.

Perhaps now you understand why the *petunia* is so dear to the pastor's heart. They are those persons who go right on doing their part without any special attention. No one fusses over them or pampers them or cultivates them. No one stops to compliment them or praise them for their dependability or loyalty.

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The following items were among the reports and business conducted and approved by Session during the Regular June Meeting of the Session via video conferencing.

The Congregational Life Committee held virtual coffee hours as a meet and greet with Pastor Peter for each District which began the week of June 15th and continued through July.

The Property Committee is working on the repair of one of the stone pillars along Edgehill Road which was damaged as a result of an automobile accident. Also, several trees on the Church property were damaged during a recent rain and wind storm requiring trimming clean up and removal of debris.

Session approved the Deacons June Mission Interpretation proposal with funds going to the following organizations: Bethanna, Face to Face, Dawn's Place, Caring for Friends, De-Paul House and Interfaith Food Cupboard.

The Church Re-Opening Task Force prepared guidelines so Carmel can safely open the church building when we can begin gathering and worshiping in person. In addition to in person worship, the guidelines provide that the service will be live streamed for those church members who may prefer to attend worship from home.

The Technology Task Force is now reviewing technology needs specifically related to live streaming of church services.

Session approved the Korean Church to return to meeting in the church building in accordance with our reopening guidelines and Pennsylvania government requirements. Currently the Korean Church video broadcasts their service with only two people who attend in person who both are in the same family.

With the exception of the Korean Church, Session approved to extend the suspension of all church activities, including worship, at the church building through July. Worship will continue via Zoom and Facebook Live.

Dear members and friends,

We are not certain when we will be able to hold in-person worship services in the sanctuary. It will depend on our ability to live-stream the service for those who prefer not to attend in person. We're working on it! In the meantime, we're sending you the guidelines that will be in effect when we do open. We hope these guidelines will make you feel safe and be safe as you return to worship. You will receive these again as we move forward.

- 1. If you are feeling sick with a fever, cough, sore throat, have been exposed to covid-19 confirmed case in last 14 days, or have elevated risk due to an underlying medical condition, please stay at home and worship with us electronically.
- 2. Masks must be worn at all times when you are in the church building. You will not be allowed in without a mask. Please put your mask on before you enter the church building.
- 3. When you arrive, using the lobby entrance only, a greeter will direct you to a hand sanitizing station and a table with the bulletins. Please use the sanitizer, take a bulletin and proceed to the sanctuary.
- 4. There will be a collection plate in the back of the church for your offering.
- 5. In order to maintain social distancing, we will use every third pew. Do not sit in the pews where the seat cushions are turned up.
- 6. Family units may sit together. All other worshipers should sit six feet apart.
- 7. During the passing of the peace, please stand in place and give the peace sign to those around you.
- 8. The service will include hymns sung by a soloist. Please stand if you are able and enjoy the hymns silently.
- 9. Hymns and lectionary readings will be included in your bulletin. Please do not handle the pew bibles and hymnals.
- 10. We will not be offering communion initially.
- 11. After worship, ushers will dismiss us by rows to maintain social distancing. Please maintain proper distance and do not linger in the church or lobby.
- 12. There will be no children's worship, nursery, or fellowship time until further notice.
- 13. If you must, please use the restroom near Fellowship Lounge. The water fountain will not be available. The office will be locked.



The Nursery School has been closed since March, but we didn't stop communicating and guiding our students. From March until June each teacher held virtual group sessions and posted art and enrichment activities on our Facebook page and through an educational app. Our music teacher conducted a full music class each week for the children, and our Yoga instructor posted 3 or 4 mini yoga classes, as well. We also had a drive-by graduation and moving up ceremony. All of the teachers were lined up in the back parking lot (socially distanced and masked, of course) and as the children were driven up, they were handed their certificates and any belongings they had left behind. We had bubbles, balloons, and end of year gifts for each of them. It was really sweet, and we had almost all of our 94 students drive through.

So now the hard part. What to do in September? We would ultimately like to open in person, but are waiting to see how things may change. We do have a smaller enrollment, but we have enough to start. We also need to be aware of the school district because we have many teachers with elementary age children. If the schools alter their plans it will affect our teachers as well. Prayers for our return to normal as soon as safely possible.
