
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Welcome to Holy Week at Carmel!

But first we have to complete the season of Lent—these past 40 days and six Sundays. And so, the journey being able to sing, Alleluia! once again continues as

Lent has given us much to ponder and remember, and challenged us as we've journeyed with Jesus and his followers these past weeks. To truly be Easter People we must follow Jesus and that's what Palm Sunday and Holy Week are all about!

Now the time has arrived—here's Holy Week!

Palm / Passion Sunday (Holy Week begins) Sunday, March 28, with worship live streaming on YouTube: 10:00 am

Passion / Palm Sunday begins Holy Week, a time in the church year when we remember how Christ gave his life in love for the world. As this service opens, the crowd waves palm branches, wanting to crown Jesus as king. But as the story of the passion unfolds, their shouts of praise turn to demands for his crucifixion: he receives a crown of thorns as he is handed over to be mocked and killed. Join us as we begin our observance of Holy Week by waving our palms as we worship live streamed from the sanctuary and we hear virtually, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!" Our Anthem will be The Holy City sung by tenor David Campbell. Through song and story, in our own voices, we'll search ourselves for the hope of transformation.

Maundy Thursday Evening Worship Thursday, April 1, with worship live streaming on YouTube: 7:30 pm

Maundy Thursday begins the Three Days (or Triduum), remembering the new commandment Jesus gave us in word and deed as he taught us how to love one another, washing our feet as a servant. Derived from the Latin word mandatum, meaning commandment, Maundy refers to the new commandment Jesus gave his disciples at the Last Supper: to love with humility by serving one another and to remember his sacrifice. We will keep this promise at our center as we hear it read again from John 13:1-17. Have bread and juice ready as we celebrate the Lord's Supper, remembering the meal Christ shared with his disciples before his death. Join us online in live streaming worship from the sanctuary and remember Christ's final challenge to his disciples around the table. The hymns this

ticularly significant as these commemorate the time Jesus hung on the cross. **Tenebrae** means "shadows", and as we read Matthew's account of the Passion of our Lord, we will experience the growing shadows of sin and this world's darkness gathering around the cross. The Tenebrae Service will be live streamed from the sanctuary with music led by David Campbell and Deb Gates, concluding with the traditional, "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord," with Deb Gates, soloist. It is an especially important time to pray for the church and the world for whom Christ gave his life.

The following items were among the reports and business conducted during the Regular March Meeting of Session.

The biggest business item for Session in March was the decision to reopen the Sanctuary for worship. After over a year of shutdown Session approved to resume weekly worship service in the Sanctuary starting Sunday April 11, 2021 under the church reopening guidelines that were prepared by the Church Reopening Task Force. The weekly maximum number of congregational members allowed to worship in person is 40, by reservation only, plus 10 worship participants. The guidelines, procedures and reservation instructions will be sent to Carmel members by email and regular mail. Session is very thankful for the work and time the task force devoted to making sure Carmel can reopen safely and within CDC guidelines.

Session approved the update to two church policies – the Policy on Sexual Misconduct and the Policy and Procedures for Counting Offering.

Congregational Life plans to hold a Mother's Day "Coffee Hour to Go" on Sunday, May 9, 2021 following worship.

The dates for Vacation Bible School were approved for Sunday, July 25 through Thursday, July 29, 2021.

From the Transitional Pastor's Study

Our Easter Challenge: "Live the Resurrection!"

Dear Friends:

Let's journey through **Holy Week** together and on **Easter Day** shout: "Live the Resurrection!"

As I write this pastoral note just shy of **Palm Sunday** as **Holy Week** begins, the **Day of Resurrection** – **Easter Day** – is just around the corner!

For us, the **Resurrection** means many things. Paul writes: "Death is swallowed up in victory" (1 Corinthians 15:54). Belief in Jesus' Resurrection is paramount in both our personal lives and as we live out our shared ministry. Paul affirms both our belief in new life now and eventually the eternal life — which means victory through Jesus Christ. As we emerge from the shadows of the **Lenten Season**, the Easter sunrise exchanges our somewhat dim Lenten reflections into bright renewed new-life and hope: both individually in our lives and as a faith community looking ahead to a **new reality** post-pandemic.

So, what does **Resurrection** mean for us? How are we changed and empowered to serve God in faith-filled ways?

Resurrection means God's help. As I said this past Sunday, we're not alone. We have life; we have hope. Yes, we experience loss—whether our loss is a family member, a loved one, or some other equally powerful loss in our life—many of us have gone through and continue to go through the Stages of Grief. John Bowlby offers three stages in grief: (1) sadness and anger, (2) disorganization and depression, and (3) reorganization. Our faith in Jesus' Resurrection offers life and hope as God nudges us forward toward promised wholeness. A fullness that comes from access to God's healing power through Jesus, who has authority over all life and who promises us his continuing presence.

Resurrection means new purpose.

In the coming weeks and months, we enter into the Vital Congregations Initiative with other congregations in our Presbytery. We enter this initiative as a part of our Transitional Ministry Mission Study seeking who we have been, who we are, and who God desires we become as we seek a new pastor. Through sermons, Bible studies and small and larger group conversations, we will ask these questions of each of the marks of vitality in a congregation. I believe the strength and promise of the Vital Congregations Initiative is that—in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic and changes it has brought and brings to our church life in community—we are able to discern what God wants us to do now-in our New Reality—and also prepare the Mission Direction to live in when the new pastor is called.

Here are those vital marks of a vital congregation:

- Caring Relationships
- Intentional Authentic Evangelism
- Spirit-Inspired Worship
- Ecclesial Health
- Lifelong Discipleship Formation
- Outward Incarnational Focus
- Empower Servant Leadership

As **Resurrection People** we discover renewed energy to re-build and strengthen our faith community and our ministries—now and into our future. We discern signs of life and hope; we reach beyond ourselves and shape our present and our future that is not yet here, and that is **okay** for now... Because the Resurrection offers us new purpose as we experience now the *fullness of life in Jesus and Jesus' calling for our future*. We are assured that loving relationships and concerned, committed lives are of enduring importance.

Resurrection also means affirmation. Resurrection means God loves each one of us as well as all of us together as a congregation. Our challenge is to do the same! For some of us, we are just beginning to discover our personal gifts and how they relate to our new life and personal ministries in the New Reality. For others, we live out our hope as we continue to invite family members and friends to be part of what God is doing here at Carmel. Resurrection is a sign of liberation from the past, sin and death. While the word victorious may seem too triumphant—especially in light of pandemic losses—the Resurrection nevertheless means we can feel victorious in our faith and be hopeful for our future—now and longer term.

Friends, my hope and prayer is for Easter's Joy to permeate through our lives, our faith community, and into our Mission Study that will directly lead into electing the Pastor Nominating Committee and the joy of our New Pastor's Arrival—roughly shy of a year from now. Easter Joy is ours most emphatically when we journey through Holy Week, fully embracing Jesus' own journey and his Cross that brings the promise of our joy! May Easter Day this year be a continuing celebration of Jesus' helping, saving presence known through our life and in our hope and by our love!

Happy Easter—and, may you live the power of the Resurrection!



We have been informed for years that bees are important to our food system. They pollinate trees and other plants so that our fruits and vegetables can grow abundantly. Many of




us use pesticides to keep weeds away from our gardens. It has been found that glyphosate, an ingredient in Roundup harms 93% of endangered species.



His message of love and justice gives us hope. Bad news, tragedy, and sorrow do not have the final word!

Believing In

Sometimes we get caught up in thinking we need to understand God in order to have faith. But faith is more about trust than knowledge; it's more about believing in someone than believing information. A child, for instance, doesn't have to know the precise roads to Grandma's house; he only needs to believe in his parents and their ability and desire to get him there safely. Similarly, we need not understand all the intricacies of how God works; we can take a cue from the disciples and let belief in the risen Christ transform and empower us.

In the words of Madeleine L'Engle (*The Rock That Is Higher*): "The disciples did not bother to try to understand the resurrection body. They doubted, and then they believed. They believed something so wonderful that it changed this broken, fragmented, beaten-down little group of men and women in a moment from depression to enthusiasm, from despair to new life, vibrant and unafraid."
