

## Three C's of Covenant Life Together

**Message of Caution**: We are a people wrestling with what it means to be church as we embrace that church is not defined by our buildings. That being said, some of us are eager to return to our buildings. This week our governor again placed restrictions on gatherings. We invite us to continue to heed the warnings of public health officials. Churches may be exempt but we have lost members of our churches to COVID-19. Please resist rushing in – may we consider the care and concern for the most vulnerable in our pews and in the world. At minimum, honor the three Ws – wear masks, watch social distancing and wash hands. Let's beat this thing together.

**Message of Courage:** On the surge of racism - we are again haunted by the question - How does the church respond? We've heard this invitation before.
