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# From the Pastor

## **Luke 10:25-37 (NRSV)**

<sup>25</sup> Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. “Teacher,” he said, “what must I do to inherit eternal life?” <sup>26</sup> He said to him, “What is written in the law? What do you read there?” <sup>27</sup> He answered, “You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself.” <sup>28</sup> And he said to him, “You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.”

<sup>29</sup> But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, “And who is my neighbor?”

At or near the heart of my understanding of what it means to follow Christ is that question - who are our neighbors? The last year has made it more difficult to know who our neighbor is in a few different ways.

Most of us have been stuck at home this whole time. For those of us fortunate enough to be able to (mostly) work from home, we rarely see anyone in person who doesn't live at our address. For some of us, there are some hidden benefits. I for example have had more time with Pam and Poppy than in any other year of our lives, at least more than any recent year, with both Pam and me able to partially work from home and Poppy attending school virtually. This can also present a challenge, of course - people cooped up with each other long-term can easily get into conflicts, and things that were small annoyances before can become bigger issues now. And of course there are those who are staying home with someone who isn't healthy for them, in relationships that can be abusive and harmful. The pandemic has made those situations much more difficult.

While we are spending more time at home than we likely did before, we are crossing paths with our neighbors less often. They too are staying home if they can. We've lost a lot of the chance meetings that kept social connections alive, and reminded us of the people who live near us. People experiencing homelessness, who are often made invisible, are even less visible now. I was ashamed to realize I hadn't even thought through the challenges facing neighbors who had to leave their shelter early in the morning and couldn't come back until the evening. How were they staying warm, and where were they using the restroom, when most businesses and buildings were closed in town? It was easy not to think of this because of how little I've been out in the last year, but still. Those are my neighbors too, and for the most part I'd forgotten them.

We also have all of the issues surrounding the last election, not caused by the pandemic but without a doubt made worse by it. Not just the violence and insurrection of January 6th, but the months of disinformation about the election that preceded those events, and the way that the algorithms of Facebook and YouTube push more and more extreme content in order to get our attention, enabling the spread of cult-like ideologies and outright bigotry. Whatever makes us angriest and most afraid gets the biggest boost on our screens, and I think the cumulative effect of that is impossible to over-estimate.

In the midst of all of this, our neighbors remain our neighbors. The literal people who live near where we live, and the many other people God brings into our lives one

way or another. We simply have to fight harder to remember who they are, and who we called to be to them. Almost every Sunday, I use the same benediction, because those are some of the best words I have to offer. Loving ourselves, our neighbors, and our enemies does not mean accepting cult-like beliefs, or bigotry, or violence. It does not mean abandoning our boundaries and our standards for how we treat one another. It does not mean that we should seek unity at the cost of consequences for violence and injustice. We must find the path that means loving ourselves enough to be true to who we are, loving our neighbors enough to be honest with them, and loving our enemies enough to not seek revenge but also not leave them free to do more harm.

When the lawyer tries to get around scripture's teaching by asking "who is my neighbor", Jesus tells a story of a traveler, a stranger beaten half to death on the side of the road. The outwardly pious and ritually clean pass by on the other side, refusing to get involved. It is the enemy, the outsider, the infidel Samaritan who helps the stranger, cares for them, and pays for them to be housed and nursed back to health. Jesus turns the question back on the questioner. Not the exclusionary, "Who is my neighbor?" but the gospel question, "To whom am I a neighbor?"

<sup>36</sup> Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" <sup>37</sup> He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

In the midst of all the challenges the pandemic brings to us, may we be neighbors to the people in our lives.

Peanut Butter, canned pasta, mac & cheese, jelly/jam, cooking oil, canned meat, pasta sauce, syrup, pancake mix, condiments, oatmeal (not instant), butter and margarine, rice, snack foods, baking mixes (with icing), spices/seasonings.

Here are the non-food items needed that CANNOT be purchased with SNAP dollars:

Deodorant, Feminine Products, Pet Food (Cats & Dogs), Dish Soap, Toothpaste, Toilet Paper, Baby Diapers (Sizes 4, 5, 6), Laundry Soap, Shampoo/Conditioner, Paper Towels, Baby Wipes, and cleaning supplies.

When we can, we share extra clothing with Alianzas for their clients.

### **Phoenixville Area Mission Funding**

[Orion Communities](#)- Orion's mission is to offer hope for individuals and families experiencing hardship due to poverty, disability or illness by building bridges that lead to self-reliance.

They help at the street level to meet the basic needs with empathy, respect and dignity. We are happy to work with Orion to fulfill requests for clothing, household items and other needed items.

People in Mission- These funds are available for youth or adult going on a mission trip, up to one half the cost. In 2018, we were able to help some members travel to Guatemala through a Donegal Presbytery sponsored trip, and in 2019 we sponsored Hands in Mission Projects such as Mission Relief Services and various summer feeding programs. COVID-19 had other plans for mission activities in 2020.

### **Regional Mission Funding**

Welcoming the Stranger- A non-profit educational ministry that seeks to follow Jesus' call to welcome people who come into our country (immigrants and refugees). With goals to provide free classes in English, computers, and US citizenship preparation to immigrants and refugees in Bucks, Montgomery and Hurderton counties in the Philadelphia, PA region. The founder, Rev. S. Sturgis Poorman Jr., retired in June 2015 from being Executive Director and taught until his death in April 2018.

### **Global Mission Funding**



## Foodology



Happy St. Patrick's Day! Enjoy these early spring recipes from your fellow congregants.



### MARY'S IRISH BREAD PUDDING



#### INGREDIENTS:

1 (2 LB) Loaf bread, less 4 slices (raisin or cranberry bread can also be used)  
3-1/4 Cups milk  
1 TBSP Butter or margarine  
1-1/2 Cups sugar  
1/4 TSP Salt

4 Eggs  
1 TBSP Vanilla  
1/2 Cup raisins (optional)

Note: 3/4 Cup Irish Cream Liquor can be added if desired

#### DIRECTIONS:

In a mixing bowl, whisk together sugar, eggs, salt, and vanilla extract. Pour into bread mixture (bread, milk and liquor). Top with nutmeg and cinnamon.  
Bake in 350° oven until set (knife/toothpick comes out clean), about 1 hour, or until golden brown.

## MOM'S IRISH SODA BREAD



### INGREDIENTS:

4 cups, sifted all-purpose flour

1/4 cup, sugar

1 teaspoon, salt

1 teaspoon, double-acting baking powder

2 tablespoons, caraway seeds

1/4 cup butter

2 cups raisins

1 1/3 cup buttermilk

1 egg

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 egg yolk, beaten


### DIRECTIONS:

1. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 2-quart casserole.
2. Sift flour, sugar, salt, and baking powder into mixing bowl. Stir in caraway seeds. Cut-in butter till mixture resembles coarse corn meal. Stir in raisins.
3. Combine buttermilk, egg, and baking soda. Stir into above mixture till just moistened. Turn dough onto lightly floured surface and knead lightly till smooth. Shape into ball and place in casserole.
4. With sharp knife, make 4-inch cross, 1/4 inch deep, in the center of the ball. Brush with beaten yolk.
5. Bake one 50-60 minutes, or until cake tester, inserted in center, comes out clean.
6. Cool bread in baking dish 10 minutes, and then turn out on rack to finish cooling.
7. When cool, promptly seal in a plastic bag to prevent "drying out".
8. NOTE: This batch will yield 4 mini loaves. Adjust baking time to 40 minutes.
