



Our new project is to coordinate **household care packages**, containing the following Dollar Store items: Laundry Detergent, Dish Liquid, Shampoo and Conditioner, Bath Soap, Toilet Paper and Toothpaste. The cost of each package will be around \$10/family. We are discussing the logistics at our next Christian Education/Christian Growth Meeting and will share with the congregation via the bulletin. ## **Congregation B'nai Jacob, First Presbyterian Church of Phoenixville, and Alianzas de Phoenixville Present a Virtual Event**

"Focusing on Inequities of Public School Funding in Pennsylvania"

Presented by: Dr. Myra Forrest; August 9<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 pm via Zoom.

Pennsylvania has the distinction of being the worst in the nation for funding inequity in our public schools.

Inequity of funding shows clear racial bias:

-The whiter the district, with few exceptions, the more money PA state funding provides to the school district.

-The more diverse the district, with few exceptions, the less money it receives from PA state funding.

Dr. Forrest has years of experience in public school administration and is currently the Education Advocate for the Pottstown Health and Wellness Foundation. She will discuss the legislative call to action that was based on the case study of inequitable school funding in Pottstown. She'll explain the current system for school funding, the devastating results, the harm in "hold harmless", and the Fair Funding lawsuit. She'll discuss reform legislation in Harrisburg and ways that individuals and groups can advocate for change.
