Insurance Board Self-Assessment is an online, self-administered inventory of a church’s 8 operations, as identified by Praesidium, that allow the user to measure one’s operations against a concrete standard. E.g., Policies contains 11 standards; Screening and Selection contains 6 for screening of employees, and 6 for screening of staff. The Final Review section includes links to PDFs of resources. E.g., the Policies section contains guidelines for physical contact, verbal interactions, off-site contact outside of regular scheduled activities, and electronic communications. The contents of the operations are based on demographic information supplied by the user, notably the membership size of the church. Accessing the tool requires establishing a user account (password protected) through a no-fee registration.
