Ministry of Clerks of Session

“Each council shall elect a clerk who shall record the transactions of the council, keep its rolls of membership and attendance, maintain any required registers, preserve its records, and furnish extracts from them when required by another council of the church.” (G-3.0104). This is the definition of a Clerk of Session per the Book of Order. As Clerks we know that our role is oh so much more! We serve the members of the body by helping them accomplish their work fairly, efficiently, and faithfully, to the glory of God. This workshop will be an interactive opportunity to explore the joys and responsibilities of being a clerk of session, with a little bit of parliamentary procedure training sprinkled in. Participants will have the opportunity to share (and mutually respond to) the questions they bring.

Finance Forum (formerly Church Treasurer Forum)

Are you a church treasurer? How about a church bookkeeper?

Anyone involved with their church's financial procedures should consider taking this course!

Kim will keep us updated on IRS reporting requirements for churches (including a parking tax!), answer accounting questions, and provide information about a CARE review that Heveron & Co. offers. Colleen will share from her experience being bookkeeper for several Presbyterian churches, and is a great resource for those of you who are involved with the daily financial duties at your church. This forum has proven to be a great place to share information and a wonderful resource for learning “what’s new” in non-profit accounting. We will also discuss church treasurer’s responsibilities. Treasurers are corporate officers of a religious not-for-profit corporation. Their duties must be carried out in accordance with federal and state law, church law, and sound accounting principles. Be sure to bring your own questions and we will take time to discuss them, along with reviewing our Presbytery’s “Guide for Church Treasurers”.

Essentials for Trustees, Finance and Property Elders

Fulfilling your property and financial responsibilities in the Body of Christ is a vital ministry in your church! Come and get the answers to everything you want and need to know to be an effective servant of Lord and your church family. This user-friendly seminar will discuss building, finance, legal and insurance issues. It will be useful for first-time trustees as well as those with experience. Is your church a hub of community activity? What needs to happen to lease space in your facility? This seminar will also introduce you to the wealth of information available on the Presbytery Trustee’s page of the Presbytery website, so you will have access to forms and information you need to help you serve the congregation. Sexual misconduct is an area of increased concern on many dimensions including liability exposure. This year we are fortunate to have Joel Gough, Risk Management Services Representative for PHL Y Insurance, the Presbytery’s insurer, join us to discuss this area of concern. He will provide a presentation that briefly highlights the landscape of sexual abuse in America, best practices for managing this exposure and the resources available to the Presbytery on this topic through PHL Y insurance.

Sabbath Practices and Intergenerational Faith Formation

Elder Lea Kone, Director, Camp Whitman, recently attended a symposium with other Christian educators to begin producing resources for churches, camps and other ministries.

The Office of Christian Formation of the PC (U.S.A.) has been examining the role of “Sabbath practices” in intergenerational faith formation. Sabbath practices give us a common language and a common way to connect with God and with each other. By sharing practices and building toward intergenerational ministries sharing these practices together, we begin to rebuild the community that is our congregation – our church. The five Sabbath practices that have been identified are: Hospitality, Prayer, Retreat, Service and Storytelling.

Coming To Our Senses

The weight of a sling stone. The smell of frankincense. The sound of joyful noise. The shape of an oil lamp. The varied tastes of bread. Presbyterians have a complex relationship with our senses, particularly regarding their role in our faith. Yet our senses provide fruitful avenues for teaching and worshiping. This workshop will examine a history of Reformed resistance to the arts, and explore ways to incorporate the arts in our ministries. Rev. Davenport will share insights from the Institute’s work with congregations, youth, and college students to create multisensory experiences for people of all ages. Participants will have the chance to engage with artifacts from the Kelso Museum of Near Eastern Archaeology, and will leave with a workbook and practical ideas for experimenting with multisensory ministry.

New York State Sexual Harassment Prevention Training

Sexual harassment is against the law. All employees have a right to a workplace free from sexual harassment. All non-profit employers, including congregations, are now required to adopt a Sexual Harassment Policy which was effective October 2018 and provide annual training for all employees, paid and unpaid. The Presbytery of Genesee Valley is committed to assist with training all congregation employees to be free from sexual harassment. In this course we will watch a video, provide opportunity for questions and answers. Case studies will be reviewed and ways to prevent sexual harassment will be discussed.

Coming Alive As a Worship Leader/Liturgist

According to the *Book of Order*, worship is a collective activity of the people of God and an expression of our common life and ministry. It demands the full conscious and active participation of the whole body of Christ, with heart, mind, soul, and strength. Therefore it is appropriate for any member of the church to pray, read Scripture, or assist in worship in other ways according to his or her gifts. This workshop is designed to build confidence and ability to lead authentic and heartfelt worship in your congregation. Rethinking Stewardship – New Strategies for Changing Times

Unfortunately, even in the face of declining memberships, many churches continue to have a, “We’re worthy, give us money” mentality with the predictable result that they struggle to fund their missions. Among the topics to be covered are: the church’s place in American philanthropy, the key reasons why people give, the roles of the pastor and Session, and the care and feeding of donors. We will offer practical tools for cultivating generosity in congregations.

7 Marks of Vital Congregations – What Are They and How Do We Get Them?

How vital is the ministry of your congregation?

How vital is your congregation to your surrounding community?

What are the “marks” of a vital congregation?

We Presbyterians sure do like big theological words. “Lifelong Discipleship Formation”, “Intentional Authentic Evangelism”, “Outward Incarnational Focus”....these are three of the 7 Marks of Vital Congregations, but just what exactly do they mean? Whether your congregation is participating in the Vital Congregations Initiative (VCI) or not, come learn the language and the nitty gritty as we dig deeper into the 7 Marks and how they are demonstrated – or not – in your congregation. The Vital Congregations Initiative is a two-year process that seeks to help congregations assess, discern and live into transformative actions that increase vitality. Not membership....vitality!

Early registrants will be sent links to key documents that describe the Vital Congregations Initiative which will be useful preparation for our conversation.

What Does It Mean to be Presbyterian? (Class size is limited to 20 participants)

Understanding White Fragility

This workshop is based on the antiracism work of Robin D’Angelo and her recently published book, *White Fragility*. After an introduction to her theories, there will be opportunity for participants to share both their reactions and their own life experiences related to racism. It is not necessary to have read the book to participate.

Teaching without Preaching

There are wonderful invitations to experiencing the holy and learning about God that can come from your creative expressions. Telling the story might be more effective than preaching the message. Let’s talk about the gifts you have and ways you can consider using them to help others attend to the sacred.

Measuring Mission

This workshop introduces a year-long, eight workshop series about best practices for congregational mission. This series has been successfully used by eight congregations in the Presbytery of Genesee Valley. These workshops teach five New Testament principles of Congregational Mission, five dynamic mission factors, and how to assess a congregation’s current mission projects on a five-step continuum beginning with toxic charity. Who should take this workshop? Congregations seeking tools to assess missional efficacy and efficiency. Congregations that want to re-engage members in social mission. Congregations willing to consider a one year commitment to a mission study process.
