Dear Pastors and Churches of the Presbytery of Genesee Valley,

In Douglas McKelvey's extraordinary book of liturgies <u>Every Moment Holy</u> (Rabbit Room Press, 2017) he shares a prayer for Medical Providers. As those who are called upon in these challenging days to offer comfort to the anxious and the Balm of Gilead to the afflicted, we can perhaps join "medical" with "ministry". In part McKelvey offers this:

"O Christ Our Healer, there is no end to malady, sickness, injury, and disease in this broken world, so there is no end to the line of hurting people who daily need my tending. Therefore give me Grace, O God, that I might be generous with my kindness, and that in this healing and care-taking vocation my hands might become an extension of your hands, and my service a conduit for your mercy...Let me practice medicine because you are a healing God who feels compassion and extends mercy. Let me practice medicine because you are near to those who are in need, to those who face grief and loss. Let me practice medicine as a willing servant of your redemption, pushing back - by means of my vocation - the effects of the fall. Let my presence in this place lend a human face to your compassion...I can do none of these things on my own. Apart from your grace, I have no grace to give. So give me your grace in greater measure, O Lord."

May grace in great measure be given to you all. Thank you for your care, creativity, resolve and resilience in this season of life and ministry.

The very first Holy Week was a time of deep uncertainty, struggle, faithful improvisation, and extraordinary examples of commitment, grace, and love. Every day was a new and serious challenge, and every day offered a stunning display of God's love through Jesus our Christ. Humbly entering Jerusalem and powerfully overturning the tables of injustice. Teaching in word and deed about the highest priority of loving God and neighbor. Serving others and giving of himself in the first Last Supper. Ending reactive violence and the power of death by submitting to the cross.
