Actions Speak Louder than Words Deacon Steve DeHart

From the Deacon's Den . . . Actions speak louder than words.

Each day I learn a little more of what it means to be a Deacon in God's church. Every day I am reminded that I am not so much one of Christ's shepherds in the church, as I am one of Christ's sheep out in the world. For me, the doors to Christ's Church serve not as a safe entry into a quiet holy space away from the world, but as an opportune exit inviting me "to go forth into the world to love and serve the Lord." Outside those church doors lies a crazy, fast, and noisy world filled with hurt, needs, concerns, and hopes. That world is my workshop, and it is never dull. Deacons are really big on doing, not so much on talking. Few on words, they are a people of action called in our Book of Common Prayer, "to a special ministry of servanthood." They are not particularly good preachers or cut out to be priests, but they serve as examples of faithful servants to all people, particularly the poor, hungry, homeless, weak, sick, lost, and lonely. As servants they cross social boundaries and go into places few people seldom choose to go. For me, it is in that world where I hear and see God the most. There I see Christ in the eyes of sad, lonely, desperate people in need of love and mercy. Here I can meet, learn and practice loving my neighbor as myself.

So, how about you? What do you see outside the church doors? If Jesus were among us here in Sheridan today, what do you suppose Jesus would be doing? More importantly, what would his church be doing? Every Christian is called to follow Jesus where there is need. In that we are all Deacons. Jesus never stayed in the confines of a synagogue. He went out into the world. It was out there, in a world surrounded by overwhelming need where you could find him. You would not have to look hard because overwhelming need was everywhere. And Jesus seemed to find where he was needed most. As followers of Jesus, we too are called to go "out there" beyond the security of our church walls to follow after him. You will not have to look hard for him. The need is still everywhere. Our task? We are to look for Christ in all others, being ready to help and serve can meet and practice, and practice, and practice loving our neighbors as ourselves. It is there where our actions, not our words, matter most.
