GREETINGS FROM FATHER DONNEL O'FLYNN:

For my article this time I'd like to give an update on important administrative matters at St. James. Behind the scenes, good, patient, basic work is occurring.

For starters, the annual audit of St. James' finances is nearing completion. An annual audit based on a "Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs" is required for every congregation of the Episcopal Church. This year the team performing the audit is led by Barb Hagen, the chief administrator of the diocese of Montana. Everyone who meets Barb comes away impressed by her cheerful good sense and vast experience. She and her colleague Manny Hoag came to Dillon on June 2 to review documents in person.

As I write, their report is still in draft form and has not yet been reviewed by the vestry. Still, some highlights can be shared. The bottom line is the assertion that the parish's financial statements as prepared for the recent Annual Meeting, "present fairly, in all material respects...the financial position of the congregation at December 31, 2020." This is standard boilerplate language for audits, and even kind of dull to read. However, in financial matters, "dull" and "standard" are exactly what is wanted! I congratulate everyone involved for making the 2020 audit eye-glazing. Once it is in final form and has been reviewed by the vestry I am committed to making it available to anyone who wishes to read it themselves. The draft does go on to make a number of procedural recommendations. They are straightforward and sensible, and most are of a minor nature. Some however are more far-reaching and will require further work, such as: making an inventory of parish belongings; reviewing parish bylaws; setting up an investment policy statement; and completing a parish accounting policy manual. I will urge the vestry to make specific plans to address all the recommendations. I believe they are ready and willing to do this. Transparent

business methods help congregations have confidence in themselves, which then gives strength to our proclamation of the love of God in Christ. So, dull though they are, they matter.

Another administrative item I am pleased about is now having a group of trained laypersons to assist the priest at celebrations of Holy Eucharist. They are essentially the same ones who lead Morning Prayer when there is no communion, in which role they are called "Worship Leaders." The new wrinkle is that now five are also licensed as "Eucharistic Ministers," who will vest and administer the chalice at communion. (As I write, we still do not have permission to share the common cup due to pandemic concerns. However, that may change in the not-too-distant future.)

Last but far from least, we can now resume singing in worship. Bishop Stebbins writes, "Congregations that wish to have congregational singing may begin to. Masks are optional, but are encouraged when singing is happening." I will work three hymns into services when I am in town. My laptop has a set of pre-recorded organ accompaniments for the hymns in the 1982 hymnal. On Pentecost (May 23) I experimented with playing some over the speaker system, and was basically pleased with the result. For now this is a workable way to support congregational singing. I look forward to doing this with you in worship more in weeks to come.
