Who is the Patron Saint of Ecology?

Yes, St. Francis, whose Saint's Day we about to celebrate this Sunday, October 4th with the Blessing of the Animals.

Here is a man of deep and rich (literally rich, but also in later life devoted to the poor) character, who lived a full life. in the 12th century. After many adventures, including founding what became the Order of Francis, he retired to contemplation and monasticism. He founded the order starting with just a few men, and want on to be recognized by the Pope, becoming an order which spread through Europe.

What did Francis have that was so appealing, to have become an order of such magnitude? A very complicated question, but one thing was clear: he was one to was willing to learn, change and adapt. He was open to opportunity, to travel, to tackle difficult problems — like the issues that were presented with the Muslims — and he worked to keep relationships with that religion and culture..

The first Pope to take the name Francis is the current Pope. Does that surprise you? This Pope, is also one to take on big issues, like climate change. Here is what Pope Francis wrote about this patron saint:

Saint Francis, faithful to Scripture, invites us to see nature as a magnificent book in which God speaks to us and grants us a glimpse of his infinite beauty and goodness. "Through the greatness and the beauty of creatures one comes to know by analogy their maker" (Wisdom 13:5); indeed, "his eternal power and divinity have been made known through his works since the creation of the world" (Romans 1:20).

May we also come to know better God's infinite beauty and goodness.

Here is a sample of the numerous questions that are on a Cultural Profile form that has been developed by the Diocese.


In Our Church...
