



A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER:

Regarding New Charitable Deduction—

The recently enacted CARES Act provides for a new \$300 charitable deduction for individuals starting with the 2020 individual tax return (to be filed in 2021). Taxpayers who are unable to itemize their deductions due to the increased standard deductions may deduct up to \$300 of charitable donations on their federal income tax return. This deduction is taken in arriving at Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) and will reduce taxable income and the resulting income tax. This deduction will reduce the income tax based on the individual's tax bracket. A taxpayer in the 12% federal tax bracket will save \$36 (\$300 x 12%) federal tax. The deduction reduces AGI which is the starting point for Michigan Individual Income Tax so it will also reduce Michigan income tax by 4.25% (Michigan tax rate) for a savings of \$12.75. Total federal and Michigan tax savings of \$48.75 based on a \$300 maximum deduction.

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions may not utilize the \$300 CARES deduction; they must itemize all charitable as an itemized deduction. Michigan Treasury has not reacted to this new deduction at this writing. Michigan Treasury could require that the CARES deduction be added-back in calculating Michigan income tax, eliminating the \$12.75 maximum savings. Time will tell.
