

HELP US HELP THE MONARCH BUTTERFLIES

Next time you are out for a leisurely afternoon drive, swing around by the church to admire the plants and flowers, since we don't regularly get to see them on Sunday mornings right now. Be sure to especially take notice of the milkweed plants that are growing in the Smith Street island gardens, and along some of the south edge of the parking lot. While we did not plant the milkweed there, Mother Nature did – with a purpose in mind.

Butterflies are one of the primary pollinators of the milkweed. The monarch butterfly needs the native milkweed species not only as delicious nectar, but also to host their eggs and larvae. When the monarch eggs hatch into caterpillars, they rely solely on milkweed for their nourishment. The larvae will not survive without milkweed. Therefore, no milkweed, no monarch butterflies.

So, while you are admiring the flowers, please do not decide to help by pulling the milkweed. Help us help the monarch butterflies. It will be exciting to watch as the season progresses, to see if we end up with a nursery of monarch caterpillars.
