

Manse Cat Weekly: Musings from Pastor Leia / her cat

"I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ," (Philippians 1:3-6).

A month ago, we began a worship series on stewardship using the theme "Our Money Story." The series has four parts: remember, release, reimagine, and restore. We all have a money story, whether we think about money as telling a story or not. The way we interact with money--spending it, saving it, wasting it, giving it away, hiding it, losing it, refusing to talk about it--can say something about who we are and what our priorities are.

Considering our own financial narratives invites us to discover and tell our money stories in light of God's money story of liberation and justice. This series encourages us to transform our stewardship practices into more full expressions of who we are and what we believe.

In worship, we tell a story of an unfettered love that changed the world. We tell a story of how we live and how we long to live. We tell this story to remember who we are and to be released from the narratives that trap us. We tell this story to reimagine this world to see what God sees and to be restored to right relationship with God

and neighbor.

This theme is intentionally direct—it invites us to name exactly what we're talking about and not skirt around it. Money and possessions are one of the most common topics in scripture, and Jesus talked about money more than faith or prayer.

The worship series is accompanied by pieces of art that illustrate each text. Artist Hannah Garrity wrote these words to accompany one of her pieces: "It is inspiring me to engage financially with the Church in a much more personal way. With sudden clarity, I connected the fact that Jesus' Church is the financial ideology I believe in. The hypocrisy that Jesus observes... is the same hypocrisy that I have always struggled with as a member of the Church of the present. So, what actions can I take, what questions can I ask, and what conversations can I have to ensure that the Church I am giving to is the Church Jesus meant to create?"

This stewardship season, we invite you to remember, release, reimagine, and restore your money stories so that we can write the one God is calling us to live into. I believe that God's story has the power to change the world and I believe that our church is an important part of the story of our community. We are the ones writing the story of our church, and we can choose to write that story to be as exciting and innovative and inclusive and interactive as we want it to be. How can we make sure that our story continues to be one that we are proud to tell?

An Important Message From Your Treasurer



Last Sunday we had the opportunity to celebrate the life of Don Harkness, long time Milan resident and philanthropist. Don's generosity, community support and humble manner were well known by many in our community. While Don was never an official member of PPC, he remembered our Church in his will, leaving us a bequest of \$50,000. We are incredibly grateful for his gift to us. At the September Session meeting it was decided to open a Money Market checking account at our bank in the amount of \$50,000. Session must approve any withdrawals from this account.

On a different note, we have incurred unanticipated expenses for various repairs that total some \$8,947 as of this writing. We repaired the burned-out parking lot lights for \$387. We incurred boiler and related heating repairs for \$5,325 to repair leaks and repair/upgrade controls. We spent \$3,235 at the Manse to add a sewer clean out so Roto-Rooter could clean out a nasty sewer blockage. Hopefully, these repairs/improvements will not recur, but it has been a cash drain during a most difficult period.

As I have repeatedly noted, we continue to break even for cash flow due solely to the on-going generosity of those who have pledged and continue to honor those pledges. When we constructed the 2020 budget, we included some \$9,500 in contributions from members who did not pledge but gave on a recurring basis. We also included \$3,000 of "cash in the plate" donations from visitors at Christmas, Easter, etc. Due to Covid-19 and the related closing, we will not see those contributions that we anticipated. We need those members who did not pledge but consistently gave to step up and pledge to support PPC's mission.

The bottom line is that it is vitally important to renew our current pledges and hopefully increase them. We need your help and support to make it through this difficult period.

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Remembering Our Members: Von Thompson








Von Thompson

Von graduated from Milan High School in 1960 and was involved in several sports. Anyone who knew Von was fully aware of his loyalty to the Wyoming Cowboys as a proud graduate of University of Wyoming.

Peoples Presbyterian Church meant a lot to Von. He was baptized on April 5, 1942, and joined the church on April 15, 1956, being a member for 64 years during which time he was an Elder for two terms. 



Give blood. Help save lives.



In May, I reached out to the American Red Cross in order to offer our building as a potential host location for a Blood Drive. After reaching out to the congregation and to the community beyond for a month, it seemed that many folks were hesitant or distracted as it was yet early in the stages of the COVID surges. I decided to wait for a time before reaching out to you all again.

I have been in contact with Michigan's booking representative, Christina Warbington. She has briefed me on all of the precautions being implemented around donations during the pandemic, and I assure you that ARC is well-prepared and will not let us conduct any of this unless they have deemed it completely safe. Ms. Warbington was so thrilled to hear of our interest as there is an urgent need for donations currently. So, here is where you can help. As I mentioned, our first step to becoming a Blood Drive host is to procure 30 names of people who can commit to donating. I am including, at the end of this newsletter, the ARC interest sign-up sheet as well as the Blood Donation Fact sheet for any and all of you to use freely. Lastly, while we are hoping for a good response in potential donors, we also want to ensure that the health and safety of our community are TOP priority. Many of you have already reached out to inform me of health or other reasons you cannot donate, and that is fine. We are not asking you to do anything you can't do. If you still want to help but can't donate, please feel free to disseminate this information and the sign-up sheet to any and all in the community who you think would be capable and interested.
