

Manse Cat Monthly: Musings from Pastor Leia / her cat

As we enter into January and the beginning of a new year that we fervently hope will be better than the one we are leaving behind, I'd like to share a few more ideas for new spiritual practices as suggested by my colleague in ministry, the Rev. Linda Kurtz, who serves at the First Presbyterian Church of Lexington, Kentucky. As we dream of a future in which we can all receive vaccinations and rebuild our lives together, I invite you to consider changing up the way you pray and seeing if one of these practices might enrich your conversation with God.

SET SACRED SPACE

This faith practice is simple: We invite you to worship. Be intentional about setting apart time to worship God from your home. Create sacred

space for yourself (and whoever you're at home with) to worship. What does creating sacred space look like? Light a candle as worship begins to remember that the light of Christ cannot be overcome. Set out a bowl and pitcher of water, and pour the water into the bowl as worship begins to remember God's grace.

Want other ideas? Watch this video by Stephen Fearing, pastor of Beaumont Presbyterian Church here in Lexington, as he talks about creating sacred space.

Now, in your time and space set apart, worship God.

MAKE A PRAYER **CHAIN**

Start a practice of making a prayer chain. Create a chain of prayer concerns during the week, either from newspapers or

writing on strips of paper. Add to it as much INSIDE THIS ISSUE as you like during the week. When you are done, lift each item on the chain up in prayer to God.

Here's a video of our friend Colleen, associate director of outdoor ministry at Camp Hanover in Virginia, modeling this practice.

NAME LOSSES AND **GRATITUDES**

As this pandemic continues into another vear, we are all in need of practices to help us make meaning from our experiences. We invite you to make a list of losses and a list of gratitudes. Having both lists can help us be honest about grief, keep us from minimizing important feelings, and prevent us from drowning in sorrow.

This article walks you through how to make these lists, and why it can help you. Though the article is framed for teenagers and young adults, the practice can work for people of all ages.

After you've made your lists, consider how all the items you've named -- whether obvious or not -- impact your faith. End your time in prayer, lifting what you've written to God.

READ A BOOK

Find yourself doing a lot of reading while self-quarantining? You can turn story time into a theological discussion! (Sounds intimidating. It's not.)

Today, grab a book and consider how it interacts with your faith. Here's a super easy way to do this with kids' books. Visit the Storypath blog and search for the book you'd like to read to see if there is a post about it. Each post provides a related Scripture text and thoughts (and, usually, questions!) on how the book relates to Scripture. It's a great starting point!

Don't have a kids' book on hand? Check out your library's e -book offerings. Connect with a young family from your church or neighborhood and discuss together via Zoom or FaceTime. (They bring the book; you bring the questions!) Or, simply read part of any book and ask yourself: What religious themes do I sense here? What Scripture text relates to those themes or this book? How can it help me understand God differently?

2 cups vanilla ice cream, softened


2 tsp nutmeg



Have you ever wondered how much time it now takes for the pastor to research, plan, and then write and coordinate the material, and then record the various segments of a worship service, and then piece it all together electronically in the right order to provide an interesting and cohesive ONLINE Sunday worship service? And the Tuesday evening Bible Study, and the Wednesday evening Prayer Service? Time. Technology. Time.



Have you ever wondered how much time it has taken for Leia to research and learn the various technologies involved in recording and assembling an interesting online service? And researching and purchasing electronic equipment needed to do this recording and photographing? And purchasing a Zoom account and learning how to use it so we can have online committee meetings and social times? What? You mean "fully-equipped technology"

expert" was not one of the specifics on our shopping list for a pastor?? How short-sighted of us. But, how were we to know Covid was coming?

Have you wondered... No? Well, neither had I – until recently. A recent comment turned on my mental lightbulb. Leia said, "fun fact: creating the 1.5 minute music video for the offertory last week, with pictures of the sanctuary during past Advent seasons, took more time to create than I was able to spend writing the sermon." ?? Who knew?? The sermon was excellent as always, and the visuals were wonderful and brought back memories. Thank you, Leia.

Have you wondered what other churches are doing in this Covid time? Have you tuned in on any other churches' covid-era worship services? Out of curiosity, I have, since many churches record and then post them on their websites for anytime viewing. Some include videos of full choirs, and hymns sung at beforetimes services, and delightful children's sermons in various settings sometimes including pets, and the sermon preached in the pastor's garden. These are obviously big churches, with tech teams and equipment in place, who were already recording services in the beforetimes. Other churches have smaller services, with maybe the pastor and the recording person — or sometimes a video camera already set up and no recording tech. Sometimes there's recorded music — sometimes not. Some services have nothing to watch except graphics, while listening to the preacher.

We are fortunate to have a pastor who, once it became obvious that we wouldn't be able to meet in person for a while, decided it was important to have interesting online worship services, and who set about learning how to make that happen since we don't have a tech team. As you watch and listen and involve yourself in worship next Sunday, I urge you to be mindful of the time and effort required to prepare and record the various parts of the service and then piece them all together.



We are also fortunate to have Doris Ann, a talented and dedicated musician who continues to choose organ music for each Sunday, comes in to practice during the week, and then comes in again so the pastor can record her playing the prelude and offertory, and singing the hymns.

I know this congregation expects good worship services. I also think we are mostly not very good at recognizing and thanking the people involved in putting those services together. I encourage you to share your thoughts and thanks and suggestions with Pastor Leia, so she knows we are out there, and paying attention, and appreciative!
