

01 January 2017: "I need the opportunity to go."

25 January 2017: (While sitting on the side of the bed.)... "We have to go."... (Louilyn: "Where?")... "We have to go."

11 February 2017, 9.23am: "... a chance to go..."

14 March 2017: "Want to go someplace far away."... (Louilyn: "Where?")... "I don't know. You can come later."

19 March 2017: "I need a chance to be useful."

14 April 2017, 10.45am: "Sometimes it is not a question of money, it's a question of searching. Where you can draw upon your creativity and talents."

14 April 2017, 8.00pm: "... to find peace where we go. Once we go there, we find peace. We have to go some place to find peace."

Easter Sunday 2017, 10.23am (Waking from sleep)... "I love that place -- 926 Lincoln Street, Greensboro (Jim's childhood home). My Mother and Daddy were very good parents. OK. Lord, yes, I will join them."

02 June 2017, 8.37am: (In bed.)... "I am praying for relief from my suffering."

29 October 2017, 4.30pm: "When are we going home? I don't know. When God calls, we will go. We are ready."

03 July 2017: "Health Care provided in need. The doctors have to decide what is needed."

27 December 2017, 6.00am: "Good morning..." (Louilyn sings to him the "Good Morning Song" which they both learned in grade school and he joins in.)... "Good morning to you. We're all in our places with sunshiny faces and this is the way to start a new day..."

DURING THE LAST EIGHTEEN MONTHS OF JIM'S LIFE, when his illness left him with very few words and limited memory, he would often utter phrases just beneath his breath while sleeping or resting. His wife, Louilyn, began to write these phrases down, some of which are noted below:

14 July 2016: "Our body comfort is tied to how we program ourselves."

16 July 2016, 11.30pm: "I have a right to go wherever I plead to go. I will take you with me."

12 August 2016, 5.30pm: "The amount of consideration, considered."

13 August 2016, 3.15pm: "Peaceful sleep."

31 August 2016, 10.45pm: (In his chair relaxing, while recovering from a bad intestinal bug) ... "Got food, love, soapy water... all providing grace."

09 September 2016, 10.17pm: (While sleeping, after renewal of Trump birthism)... "The irony is that he can do that today... say that today."

14 October 2016: (Late night)... "Basketball was a great part of my life, Dudley, JCSU, release of stress. Played basketball but JCSU insisted on graduation... it was a given."

17 October 2016, 4.11pm: "Need words to find release from our suffering."

17 October 2016, 4.12pm: "Recognize that you are a sinner and need Christ to find your way. Christ-like ways... kind, loving, compassionate. Christ is behind me. He is saying, 'come, turn around and follow me'."

29 October 2016, 3.30am: "Louilyn, we help each other."

14 November 2016, 4.00am: "Please don't limit their (African-American) educational opportunities."

20 December 2016, 5.50am: *"Finding a chance to stop..."* (Louilyn: "Stop what?") ... *"Stop the way I feel."*




REVEREND DR. JAMES HESTER HARGETT: A PASTOR EMERITUS

To many, James Hester Hargett was known as "Jim"; to his early friends, "Hargett"; to relatives, "Dad", "Granddaddy", "Uncle Jim", Uncle James", "Jim"; to parishioners, "Jim", "Pastor Jim", "Rev. Jim", "Rev. Hargett", "Pastor Hargett", "Dr. Hargett"; and to God, "My son".

On a very hot day -- July 24, 1930 -- in Greensboro, North Carolina, James Hester Hargett was born to Rev. F.A. and Mrs. Florence (Hester) Hargett, Sr. As a child and youth, he was within walking distance of the public schools and the comprehensive Windsor Community Center with an Olympic size swimming pool and many recreational activities. His susceptibility to anything contagious, including Chronic Bronchitis, challenged him at an early age to overcome adversity. These conditions helped him to advance his love of reading, music and extra-curricular activities, which included varsity sports in senior high school and college. Greensboro also proved to be a fertile ground for life-long friendships. Jim was a part of the nucleus of a group of young men, all graduates of Dudley High School, who recognized each other's early intellectual and professional ambitions. They respected and supported each other throughout their lifetimes, creating a bond that could only classify them as an extended family.

James H. Hargett graduated from Johnson C. Smith University, Charlotte, North Carolina, with a B.A. in Political Science (Pre-Law). The combination of Christian nurture, in home and church from birth, to the intellectual stimulation of a scholarly African-American JCSU Professor of Religion and theologian, with a Ph.D from the University of Chicago, focused meaning and brought fulfillment to his faith journey. He could then, in his senior year, respond to the call to full-time Christian service. Jim would later serve on the Board of Trustees of JCSU and, after sixteen years, retire as Trustee-Emeriti.


In 1950, during his junior year at JCSU, Jim met Louilyn Funderburk, an incoming freshman from Lancaster, South Carolina. They would marry in 1954, with Dr. Howard Thurman, Dean of Chapel at Boston University, performing the ceremony.


In the start of his professional career, nothing less than a Master of Divinity degree from Yale University Divinity School, New Haven,

Connecticut, could have made it possible for him to be called as Associate Minister at the Church of the Crossroads, Honolulu, Hawaii, upon graduating in 1955. The predominately Japanese-American, multi-ethnic congregation gave him the experience of what diversity could be like on Mainland, U.S.A., for persons of African-American descent. His immersion in community began with the elected position of Territorial Youth Advisor (Hawaii was not yet a State) for the denomination and he also served as volunteer Chaplain at Oahu Prison in Honolulu.

In 1958, after three years in Hawaii, James H. Hargett accepted a call to The Congregational Church of Christian Fellowship, United Church of Christ, Los Angeles, which was founded as a multi-racial, multi-ethnic church. It became predominately African-American with a strong social action and social justice consciousness, and civil rights advocacy. Responding to community needs, the Church facilitated and enabled in health, education and the arts. Jim served as the Southern Christian Leadership Conference's West Coast Convener, and marched with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama. He also helped to organize the Poor People's Resurrection City in Washington, D.C. The developments in Church initiated programs and Civil Rights led to a dramatic membership growth in eleven years.

He became Secretary for Black Ministries, United Church of Christ Council for Church and Ministry, New York, New York, in 1969. He challenged African-American young people to consider full-time Christian service, created scholarships for seminary education and documented the existence of churches in transitional communities of racial and ethnic change. He believed these churches could become continuing relevant ministries. He served one of those churches, Livingston Avenue United Church of Christ, in New Brunswick, New Jersey; a historic Evangelical-Reform (German) church. During those three years, Jim was part-time Chaplain at Livingston College (Rutgers University) and Adjunct Professor at Douglas College (Rutgers University). His Doctorate of Ministry from Colgate-Rochester Divinity School was awarded in 1975. He, along with nineteen other multi-denominational African-American ministers, focused studies on tracing the history of the religious experience of African-Americans in Ghana, Nigeria, Haiti, Jamaica and the Sea Islands of Georgia and South Carolina.





The Congregational Church of Park Manor, UCC, Chicago, called James H. Hargett in 1977. While pastoring this large, African-American congregation, he became the first African-American minister on the Board of Directors of the Evangelical Health Systems after seventy-seven years of history and chaired a task force that determined the establishment of health centers on the southside of Chicago. He also served a one-year term as President of the Friends of the Chicago Public Library. His work on the Advisory Board of the Bensonville Home Society, and as one of the founding Board Members of One Church-One Child, further defined his ministry of mission to community and society.

Jim travelled to North Africa, Spain and Portugal with a group to study the history of the Moors. While wrestling with the pain and agony of the African-American experience and pilgrimage, he created liturgical services commemorating events in African-American history from "Blood Row" (the Crossing) and Slavery, to the martyrdom of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., composed of spirituals, scripture and vignettes.

A small Congregation deeply rooted in the United Church of Christ traditions, Christian Fellowship Congregational Church, UCC, San Diego, called James H. Hargett as Minister in 1986. Under his leadership, the Church continued to develop the liturgical services with Jim and to focus on missions, locally and globally. Locally, the vision of a Children's Care Center was adopted by Church and community. Globally, mission trips were taken to southern Africa with the deliverance of a model solar-powered water desalinization machine to drought-stricken Mozambique and resources were provided to Angola for land mine removal. Upon the return from southern Africa, two missionaries were commissioned: a retired pediatrician to Chickore, Zimbabwe and a retired nurse to Lesotho in southern Africa. Back in the U.S., a multi-age group took a mission tour of the six predominately Black colleges established by the American Mission Society immediately after slavery, which resulted in some students attending and graduating from these universities. The adults and youths of the Church initiated a scholarship fund for college-bound youth and began contributions to the endowment funds of the universities. In southeast San Diego, Jim was one of the Consultants, Advisors and founding Developers of the Baker Elementary-UC San Diego Medical School Student Run Free Clinic.
