### **Program Notes for Sept. 20 and Dave Dersham**

Was the political philosopher Antonio Gramsci correct? Does ossified, old world thinking have to die away — almost entirely — in order for a new way of thinking to be born, or is it more that these modalities grind against one another in perpetual parallel, alternating between periods of amplification and periods of contraction — sometimes even at the same time? Such questions will be touched upon through the medium of song at our Sept. 20 Zoom service.

Dave Dersham calls himself a "meandering fool." In his 20s, he spent a searing Wyoming summer prepping gruel for Dornan's chuck wagon in the Tetons; taught Eco-Ed to middle schoolers in the Black Hills; trekked the sage and occasional cottonwoods with underserved youth in southern Idaho; and explored the cultures of Belize, Guatemala, and Honduras.

In his 30s he was part of Cambridge folk scene where he completed his first CD, "The Burn of Summer." The album enjoyed regular airtime on folk radio's WUMB, Emerson College's WERS, and produced a finalist selection for the nationally syndicated Mountain Stage Emerging Artist competition. His second album, "Gilding the Lilies" was recorded with the assistance of Lloyd Thayer's unorthodox lap-steel, as well as the shrewd production/instrumentation of Jared Fiske. The CD was released in the fall of 2011 and was distributed internationally.

He lives Northampton, MA and tours the subterranean folk pockets of the Northeast, Southern California and Texas. He's currently working on his third collection of songs to be released in 2020.

### Historical Perspectives of UU

Ten years ago, I wrote a series of columns about Unitarian Universalism history. I know with good authority that no one remembers my columns from ten years ago, mainly because I, myself, do not remember them. In these old columns I didn't get much beyond the eighteenth century, thus letting much of UU history remain unexamined. Recently, I thought that I would revisit the history of our religion, first starting with my old columns (with revisions) and then continuing on through important aspects from the nineteenth and twentieth century for both sides of our faith. Bear in mind that I am neither a historian nor a theologian, so I may get a few things wrong. It won't be the first time. Remember to read the footnotes - snide comments (and historical perspectives) abound.



### Why Trinitarianism?

The question is not so much why are there Unitarians, but why are there Trinitarians? With the exception of the Johannine Comma (1 John 5:7-8, which we will consider at a later date), there is no mention or inference of the trinity in the New

Testament.<sup>1</sup> The concept of the Trinity itself is a confusing one - One God, but three different aspects: The Father, The Son, and The Holy Ghost. And truly, there is no good analogy for understanding the Trinity. It is impossible to know when the divinity of Jesus was first considered. But by the end of the second century C.E., Christianity had become almost exclusively a Gentile faith,<sup>3</sup> and the Christians in Alexandria Egypt had whole-heartedly embraced the concept of the divinity of Jesus.<sup>4</sup> These Egyptian theologians created sect of Christianity which incorporated aspects of Gnosticism, and Horus, Isis, and Mithras worship.<sup>5</sup> And these Alexandrian Trinitarians, believed that God had three equal aspects: The Father, the creator; The Son, as manifested in Jesus; and The Holy Ghost, which inspired the actions of ordinary men. However, there was a different theology being developed in Asia Minor – that of Unitarianism. The Unitarians believed that Jesus may be the greatest and the best of all men, the holiest of prophets and a divinely-inspired teacher, but he was not God. The chief advocate of the Unitarian viewpoint was an Alexandrian priest named Arius.<sup>6</sup>

Though Christianity started off as a persecuted minority religion, that changed by the beginning of the fourth century C.E. when the emperor Constantine I declared Christianity the state religion of the Roman Empire. Constantine supported the Church financially, built various basilicas, granted privileges (e.g., exemption from certain taxes) to clergy and promoted Christians to high ranking offices. But soon, the diversity in and the fighting among Christian philosophies so alarmed the emperor Constantine I (who, in part, owed his success

to the support given by Christians) that he convened the Council of Nicaea in 325 C.E. and ordered the bishops to settle the matter once and for all.<sup>8</sup> And thus the stage was set for a showdown between Trinitarianism and Unitarianism.

The Council of Nicaea was inherently a power struggle between two parts of the Roman empire, Asia Minor and Egypt, and the Egyptians won. The council voted to adopt the trinitarian Nicene Creed to which all Christians must adhere. Arius and several of his most vocal supporters were sent into exile. Most histories of Christianity seem to consider the controversy settled at this point. This is not at all the truth - the battle continued. The bishop of Nicomedia, Eusebius, was a staunch supporter of Arianism, and he had Constantine I convene a synod of bishops in 335 at Tyre. This council reversed the decisions at Nicaea, and now it was the Trinitarians who were sent into exile. Constantine I's son, Constantine II, was a fervent Arianist. Thus it looked like Trinitarianism would die out. However, every man dies, and when Constantine II died, his cousin, Julian (who was a pagan), became emperor and established complete religious freedom in the empire. Although Julian's reign did not last long, it allowed Trinitarians to return to the empire.

In 381, a second ecumenical council to be held at Constantinople was called by the Emperor Theodosius I who was a staunch Trinitarian. At this council Unitarianism was again declared outlawed and Theodosius threw the full power of his empire behind this decision: Arians and all other heretics were forbidden to assemble, their churches were seized, and there was no longer any freedom of worship for any Christians except for those that followed the official position of the Catholic Church. Early Unitarianism was crushed.

<sup>1</sup>So concluded Sir Isaac Newton after severe scrutiny of the Gospels. (Of course, being an ambitious man, Newton confided his heretical views mainly to his private journal.)

<sup>2</sup>For example, the analogy of St. Patrick used with the three leaves of the shamrock committed the heresy of Partialism. Modalism and Arianism are also popular heresies.

<sup>3</sup>In the Jewish Rebellion of 70 C.E., the strongly pacifistic Jewish followers of Jesus refused to participate, and they were labeled traitors by their fellow countrymen. At this point all Jewish conversions to Christianity stopped almost completely.

<sup>4</sup>In fact, they embraced the divinity of Jesus so strongly that the Coptic Church, which espouses monophysitism (a denial of the humanity of Jesus), split off from the Catholic Church in the fifth century.

<sup>5</sup>And are still incorporated in mainstream Christianity.

<sup>6</sup>And thus Trinitarians claim that Unitarianism commits the heresy of Arianism.

<sup>7</sup>Constantine I understood the political importance of having a substantial (even if it was only a minority) portion of the population thoroughly indebted to him.

<sup>8</sup>Constantine I realized that if the Christians went to war among themselves, they wouldn't be much help against his enemies.

<sup>9</sup>This was partly because of idealism, but partly because Julian wanted the various Christian sects to tear each other apart.
