

Pastor's Report

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I reflect back on 2016, I am grateful for all that you, the people of GLC, have helped to accomplish as we continue to strive to live out our mission of being a Christ-centered community church, nurturing the faith of all generations.

One of the big highlights this year was the addition of two new pieces to our worship space.

In January 2016, a baptismal font given in memory of Lois and Wayne Seter by their family arrived. The older font that has graced the sanctuary was starting to wear from years of use along not having a finished interior or castors. In designing the new font, we specifically asked that it be finished all around including inside, while also having castors added to help aid in the mobility as we move it from front to back.

The other piece, an altar stand, was received in December 2016 in memory of Lloyd and Marlys Olson by their family. This piece was created by TJ Hopkins and has already become a beautiful addition to the sanctuary, permitting the original altar to still have a strong presence while making it easier to preside over communion as a community.

Both pieces help to enhance our worship space while providing functionality, beauty and the longevity of carrying out and participating in the sacraments that we as Lutherans hold dear, Holy Communion and Baptism.

This year also brought the start of some new program opportunities including Adult Bible Study and a Book Study. In the spring we held a book study on the book titled *The Collapse of Parenting* each Wednesday night. The attendance varied from 7-10 people and the discussion was fruitful. Bible Study was held in the spring as we looked into the book of Ruth. This fall another study was held that looked at Paul's book of Galatians. We will be continuing Sunday Morning Bible studies starting in January with the book of Esther. It is hopeful that another book study will also be able to happen.

Another big step for our congregation was the church council taking on the task of bringing our constitution into compliance with the Model ELCA Constitution. During the review, there were some areas that the council felt could be adapted to better fit the needs of our constitution. These will be voted on at the Annual Meeting and hopefully again at a special congregational meeting to officially set the new constitution in motion.

2016 also brought an opportunity for me to better serve one of our ministry partners by serving on the Board of Directors. In March I was officially elected to the Pathways Board, in April I was asked to serve as Vice-Chair, and in August I officially accepted the position Board Chair. The journey with the Pathways board has been very insightful and continues to help me understand our working relationship even better, while continuing to strive toward helping our youth experience the wonder and excitement that is summer camp.

Overall this year, I am thankful for the many people who have surrounded me, supported me, and continue to help Glyndon Lutheran be a place where ministry is exciting, while continuing to offer the potential to grow in our ministry and outreach.

This year I had the joy of welcoming 3 new brothers and sisters in Christ through the sacrament of baptism, while also getting to celebrate a remembrance of baptism for Jaxton Walker. As many of you know, these are one of my favorite parts of ministry and I am honored to be able to welcome them not only into the family here at GLC, but also into the family of God.

Other pastoral acts done this year include 11 prayer services/funerals along with the confirmation of 10 youth in October.

In closing, I would like to offer a special thank you to Kris and to Lois for all of the help that they offer on a weekly basis with faith formation, worship, administrative duties and more. I would also like to extend a special thank you to those who serve on the council. Your commitment and dedication are greatly appreciated and a catalyst for helping to make GLC a better place each and every day. As we move ahead in 2017, I look forward to continuing to serve GLC with you as our leadership team while also visioning about what our future may bring.

Some things change

Synod

In 2016, the partnership that Glyndon Lutheran has with the Synod remained at 1/4 time. My Synod position continued to be primarily planning and executing the Synod's Youth Gatherings. Due to a winter storm, I had to cancel the Middle School Gathering, but we are hoping to reschedule it to the end of April 2017. I was in charge of the youth delegates at the Synod Assembly in May, and now I am part of the Synod Assembly planning process. The Practice Discipleship initiative that I have been the Synod Coach for the past five years has phased out in 2016; it may be recreated into something different in the future. I took to two youth delegates from the LYO Board of the Synod to Luther Ridge Bible Camp in November for the ELCA Youth Leadership Summit. I was elected the Chair for the SYMBOL (Synodical Youth Ministry Band of Leaders) Network; I have been the Region 3 Representative the past three years. I lead video conference calls, write/create a newsletter, and work on Continuing Education opportunities as well as represent SYMBOL at events like the Faith Formation Summit at the ELCA Churchwide Headquarters in April.

I know that this report is for my work that I get to do with the good people of Glyndon Lutheran, but this is one change that I cannot avoid. I will be married by the time these annual reports come out. I truly appreciate your care and support of Justin and I and our future life together as husband and wife.

Some things remain the same

Faith Formation

Though some has changed in the area of Faith Formation most of our programming has remained the same. For a third year we have partnered with Dilworth Lutheran for Day Camp for our Elementary-aged young people. It is a joy to work with Dilworth Lutheran and the Pathways Summer Staff to make learning about God/faith an exciting thing. This past year the theme was "The Jesus Way" both at Camp Emmaus and at Day Camp. I got to spend some time at camp this summer with some of our young people.

I meet with the three year olds - 4th graders on Sunday mornings after worship and Wednesday evenings before worship.

The 5th and 6th graders meet after school on Wednesdays diving into the Biblical narrative. I also led the 5th graders in their 5 week First Communion preparation.

The 7th and 8th graders meet after worship on Wednesdays; I work with the Pastor Kayla and prepare the lesson plans in the winter and spring. This past year the focus was on the Lord's Prayer and prayer. And this past fall we have been learning about why we are called to do service, Martin Luther, and the liturgical year; this spring we will focus on the Ten Commandments.

For 9th grade Faith Formation, Pastor Kayla and I continue to meet for monthly "mini-retreats" for four hours, one Sunday a month, October – February. We continue to use the Apostle's Creed as the center of our time together. We will also had a retreat day in the spring to help them shape their Faith Statements for their Affirmation of Baptism; the service which will remain on Reformation Sunday of their 10th grade year.

Service Opportunities

I continue to plan and execute the Servant Events for the 7th, 8th and 9th graders, including two Twin Cities trips. One in the fall to pack meals at Feed My Starving Children and go to ValleyScare and the 36 Hour Adventure in the summer which includes fun activities and service opportunities. This past summer a Senior High student and I went with Dilworth Lutheran on a Youthworks Mission Trip to Milwaukee, WI.

But one thing will never change

As the verse states at the beginning, Jesus Christ is the same, unchanging, and is the only constant in our lives. Looking ahead to 2017 is exciting, as long as our focus remains on Jesus, our ministries may change direction, or not. It says earlier in the book of Hebrews that we should "fix our eyes upon Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith." As a fellow minister of Glyndon Lutheran, I will try to do this, and I ask the same of you.

Our circle members attended the Annual Prayer Breakfast which was held April 14th at the Hilton Garden Inn in Fargo. The speaker was River Jordan, a noted southern storyteller and author of several books as well as a playwright. Approximately 500 area women attended this event.

Our Esther and Mary Circle members served the Spring Cluster 6 dinner meeting on April 28th. It was held at our church. We served approximately 85 women a delicious dinner. We invited Rob Swiers, Director of the New Life Center in Fargo, to be our main speaker. Dr. Jean Hellner, who was our organist at that time, gave a short history on our historic organ. Jean and her daughter, Vanessa, provided special music.

Our circle members served a noon luncheon for the Women's Auxiliary of the New Life Center in Fargo on May 20th. We served approximately 80 women. We only serve this luncheon once every five years so the next time will be in 2021. Pastor Kayla gave the devotional. After the meeting we were given a tour of the facility by Rob Swiers, Director of the NLC.

On July 21st our circle members participated in the ladies annual retreat. It was held at the lake home of Lorraine Langseth on Turtle Lake. A potluck lunch was served along with morning and afternoon coffee. Nine women were in attendance along with Pastor Kayla. Pastor Kayla gave an excellent presentation. We're hoping more women will attend next year!

Our members participated in the Moorhead Conference for Women of the ELCA on October 15th. A Fall brunch was held at Christ the King Lutheran Church in Moorhead. Pastor Mary Suomala Folkerds from Good Shepherd Lutheran Church was the speaker. She shared highlights of the joint mission by Christ the King and Good Shepherd Lutheran Churches to Jamaica.

Our circle gave \$300.00 towards the purchase of lefse for our Fall Harvest Home Supper. We also participated in the frying of the chicken for the supper.

We gave \$200.00 towards the purchase of new toilets for the church: Fund-a-John project. The newly formed Men's Group did the installation. We thank them for their labor!

New Life Center Auxiliary

New Life Center's Mission:

The New Life Center has been meeting needs and transforming lives through the love of Christ since 1907. We help people who are homeless and hurting go from merely surviving to truly thriving. Our aim is to help them discover value and find hope.

Founded as the Glad Tidings Mission, the New Life Center has evolved from an organization that primarily conducted religious services and neighborhood outreach work to a Christian multi-faceted emergency and crisis service center.

Darlene Sandal and Pat Hemmah are the representatives for Glyndon Lutheran Church to the New Life Center auxiliary (NLC). We meet at area churches once a month for a noon luncheon, business meeting, and program. A major fundraiser for the auxiliary is the Prayer Breakfast held each spring. Several hundred women attend this event.

Glyndon Lutheran Church was asked to donate items of clothing (socks, underwear, gloves, and stocking hats) during December to be given as Christmas presents for the residents. We offer thanks to all who helped us make this year a success while continuing to support the NLC!

The stats for the NLC for 2016 has an average of 110 guests per night, served 81,278 community meals, and averaged 222 people per day. 1632 adults and 297 children received clothing, furniture, and other household essentials, at no cost through the New Life Center Thrift Store household voucher program.

As 2017 begins, we look forward to sharing with you how NLC continues to make a difference in the F-M area community. Also, if you interested in becoming a member of the auxiliary, please contact either Darlene or Pat. You are more than welcome to attend a meeting with us to "test the waters."

In late May we were honored to attend the Synod Assembly as representatives of Glyndon Lutheran Church. The focus and overall atmosphere of the assembly revolved around "Speaking the Truth in Love". A number of meetings took place allowing us the opportunity to see leaders and other representatives work to make our Synod an organization that worked through core principals, well developed values, and future endeavors. A core group of churches that would allow us to thrive within the ELCA and work through God's love to volunteer, donate, and reaffirm our need and support for young Pastors and those who wish to seek and pursue work within the ELCA at all levels.

While in attendance we were grateful to be able to attend a keynote speaker, Nadia Bolz-Weber. She is about as real and frank as a Pastor can be, but within that is able to relate to many people from all walks of life. Her story and her mission is such an inspiration that we would encourage others to look her up and also to read some of her books. Our daughters, age 11 and 10 were able to attend the keynote with us as well. It was great to see individuals spanning several generations witness emotion, growth, and acceptance during the presentation. We both attended very traditional churches during our youth so learning about how welcoming a untraditional church was provided a understanding that regardless of how your faith develops it is how you feed it and live within it that really matters. All are deserving of God's love and acceptance from others without judgment.

The assembly also offered us the opportunity to attend growth groups which included a variety of topics. We attended a group focusing on wellness within the congregation and for the leaders of our Synod churches. We also attended a group that enlightened us all on a tough topic, sex trafficking. As it is easy to look away it is something we should all be aware of in hopes that we are able as a society to rescue and prevent such activities. Each life is of value and worth and it is important to remember that it only takes one instant to positively impact the world around us.

The second day involved an engaging Church Service in which Nadia Bolz-Weber delivered the sermon reiterating the message "Speaking the Truth in Love". We enjoyed amazing music, Communion, and hearing readings and messages from other Leaders within the Synod. Following the Service, there was a formalized Synod meeting which involved, budget reviews and approvals, hearing concerns and proposals from different Synod members, and voting to approve resolutions.

We would recommend that if offered the opportunity to attend one of these events that you seriously consider being a representative of your Church and congregation. Yes, you will experience some Church "business sessions" that may not fully grasp your attention, but a moment out of two days full of enrichment and insight make it a wonderful experience.

2016 BISHOP'S REPORT TO THE NORTHWESTERN MINNESOTA SYNOD, ELCA

FOR ANNUAL MEETINGS OF THE CONGREGATIONS

Starting February 1, 2016 the Northwestern Minnesota Synod made two major changes in how it operates. We lived into *a new structure* (adopted at the 2015 synod assembly) moving from 10 conferences to 8 conferences, encompassing 24 clusters of congregations. And the synod also embarked on a pilot project with six other synods, in collaboration with the ELCA Mission Investment Fund, to form *Synod Financial Services (SFS)*. SFS provides comprehensive financial services to our synod, including revenue processing, accounts payable, general accounting and reporting.



Throughout 2016 our steering committee and synod staff lifted up *Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA*. Eleven Campaign events were held across the synod to present the goals of the Campaign to potential donors and congregational leaders. We are over one-third of the way to our own synod's goal of \$4.75 million for the Campaign. Many of our synod's congregations participated in "Forty Days of Giving" for ELCA Hunger during Lent 2016, in conjunction with the Campaign. As of the end of September 2016 the Campaign for the ELCA had received \$96 million toward its \$198 million goal.

Spring events in the synod included a Joint Theological Day on "Caring for Our Common Home" (stewardship of the environment) in March, that featured Dr. Larry Rasmussen, retired professor from Union Theological Seminary in New York. Over 200 ELCA pastors and Catholic priests and deacons gathered at the Church of Saints Anne and Joachim in Fargo for this event co-sponsored by the Crookston Diocese, Eastern ND Synod ELCA, Fargo Diocese and NW MN Synod ELCA. In April the synod's Senior High Youth Gathering featured speaker, Pr. Jonathan Swenson and musician Taylor Wilson at Castaway Club, on the theme: "The Word Became Flesh."





Over 500 Lutherans gathered at Concordia College, Moorhead, MN, for the 2016 NW MN Synod Assembly on the theme "Truth and Love at the Crossroads." Best-selling author, Pr. Nadia Bolz-Weber was the keynote speaker, and Pr. Ron Glusenkamp of the Campaign for the ELCA was our churchwide representative. The Assembly passed resolutions on affirming the MP4ME Designated offering for our Synod Partners; financial support for seminary students; support of the Bible Women of the Andhra Evangelical Lutheran Church (AELC) in India; support for the Phebe Hospital Solar Project, PV (Photovoltaics) for Phebe; and the dissolution of Lutheran Campus Ministry of Minnesota, Inc.

In May, the synod welcomed *John Bell* as our new Communications and Events Coordinator. Among John's first accomplishments was the creation of a new synod website that went live on September 1. He also created video clips and a Congregation Toolkit for the Campaign for the ELCA.

Twenty-four parishes and ministries of the synod welcomed new rostered ministers in 2016. Seven of these pastors were ordained in 2016 to serve their first calls in the NW MN Synod: Pr. Matthew Zelie, Our Saviors Ten Mile Lake of Dalton and First Presbyterian of Ashby; Pr. Keith Lankford, Good Shepherd of Henning; Pr. Ben Jacobson, First of Alexandria; Pr. Carleton Smee, Bethany of Nevis and First of Akeley; Pr. Janna Bader, Neighbors in Faith Parish of Kensington; Pr. Taylor Wilson, Good Shepherd of



Moorhead. Suzi Porter was commissioned as an ELCA Associate in Ministry, serving Trinity of Detroit Lakes. In addition, thirteen lay persons with theological training are serving as Synodically Authorized Ministers in thirteen parishes and ministries of the synod. Currently there are twelve persons from our synod preparing for rostered ministries in the ELCA.

During the summer months ELCA Mission Builders partnered with local volunteers to put up new cabins at Luther Crest Bible Camp, Alexandria. Pathways Bible Camps installed Pr. Steve Peterson as executive director and Brooke Klemetsrud as program director.




Twenty-two members of NW MN Synod congregations were among the 945 voting members that met during the 14th Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in New Orleans, LA, August 8-13. The Assembly took many actions such as electing William B. Horne II of Clearwater, FL, as ELCA Vice President; approving the Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry and Eucharist that lifts up 32 statements

of agreement between Roman Catholics and the ELCA; approving unification of the ELCA's current three lay rosters (associates in ministry, deaconesses, and diaconal ministers) into one roster of Ministers of Word and Service who will be called "deacons;" approving ELCA churchwide budget proposals for 2017 through 2019; passing resolutions on issues like preventing suicide, alleviating global hunger, deepening relationships with historic black churches, respecting Native American rights, and welcoming refugees; electing ELCA members to 60 positions of leadership in the churchwide organization; and amending governing documents of the ELCA.

Autumn synod events included *Mission Interpreter Training* events in August and September; a brunch (co-sponsored with the Eastern ND Synod) in October for *Retired Pastors and Spouses*; and the *Spouses of Clergy Retreat* (together with the SW MN Synod) at Luther Crest Bible Camp, Alexandria, in early November; at Grace, Detroit Lakes.

Wonderful speakers, preachers and teachers spoke at synod events throughout the year: Dr. Mark Tranvik, of Augsburg College; Dr. David Creech of Concordia College; and Dr. Michael Chan of Luther Seminary led School for Lay Ministry courses (co-sponsored with the Eastern ND Synod). Ambassador Daniel Speckard, CEO of Lutheran World Relief, spoke to folks from the Eastern ND and NW MN Synods. Pr. Adam Copeland of Luther Seminary spoke on "Generosity Across the Generations" at a synod stewardship gathering. Dr. Barbara Lundblad retired professor from Union Theological Seminary lectured at the fall Theology for Ministry Conference. Pr. Jodi Houge of Humble Walk Lutheran Church in St Paul addressed the Synod Women's Organization convention.

As you gather, the following questions are frequently asked about giving and the work of the church. These may be helpful as your congregation engages in conversation about how to grow and thrive in the future.

What is missional giving?

One way individuals and congregations participate in missional giving is when their financial contributions, often called offerings or tithes, to and through their congregation, or other charitable organizations, are intended to do God's work in the world. We believe this work can be done faithfully through ELCA ministries.

Why give?

For some the answer is God first gave to us, thus through our life we have an opportunity to share God's generosity with others. This understanding demonstrates giving is a spiritual issue, not a financial one. For other Lutherans, the answer is also an identity issue. We are faithful Lutherans and this is what we do — share with others. This is not an individual experience only, for we are church together, and through our unified giving we do God's work.

Who gives?

All are invited to give as God has blessed them and as the Spirit moves them.

What to give?

As the apostle Paul wrote of the Christians in Macedonia, "They first gave themselves to the Lord." Through baptism, confirmation and our confessional statements, each person first gives of themselves to God. Within each person's faith walk, they are asked to give of their time, talents and resources. This can take many forms.

How much to give?

We teach to grow toward a tithe (10 percent of household income), to a tithe and beyond a tithe as God has blessed you. This may also apply to one's time.

When to give?

Individuals and congregations are encouraged to give regularly. The practice of "first fruits" giving, sharing a portion of God's blessings when they are received, is encouraged. This may be weekly, monthly or quarterly. There are also times for special giving. This is often in response to specific needs or opportunities. There are also times for planned gifts. This is often for major projects or at the end of life. All these forms of giving are encouraged.

Where to give?

Most supporters of the ELCA do the majority of their giving to and through their congregation. When growing toward and beyond a tithe, giving to all charitable organizations is considered.

How to give?

All regular giving received by ELCA congregations is considered undesignated. This means the dollars received can be used as determined by a missional budget or expense plan approved by a quorum of the membership and as managed by elected leaders. An increasing percentage of total giving to congregations is being designated for specific purposes. While we appreciate and celebrate all giving and respect the wishes of the donor, we also trust members and elected leaders to make financial decisions that support God's work in and beyond the local community, both in the present and for the future.

What is Mission Support?

This is the portion of your congregation's regular financial offering that is shared with your synod. The synod then shares a percentage for God's work that we do together through our ELCA churchwide organizations, both domestically and globally.
